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


Mike Blain honored at Israel Bonds luncheon

Michael Blain was born in a village in Carpatho-Ruthenia, which was part of the former Czechoslovakia, later part of Hungary and now part of the Ukraine. He left home at age 14, living in Hungary, the former Soviet Union, England, and for brief periods in other countries before coming to the United States in 1949.

Mike is a Holocaust survivor and a U.S. Army Korean War veteran. He holds a B.S. degree from Rochester Institute of Technology where he was the founder and first president of Hillel and edited the college newspaper.

After moving to Cleveland in 1957, Mike was president of his B'nai B'rith lodge and its 1971 Man of the Year; vice-president of Ohio State and Greater Cleveland B'nai

B'rith Lodges; vice-president of Toastmasters club; editor of the *Cleveland Craftsman*, a prizewinning technical magazine; and was named Outstanding Craftsman of the Year in 1970 and Editor Emeritus in 1974.

In Indianapolis Mike has served on the boards of Beth-El Zedeck, B'nai Torah, JFGI, JEA/BJE, JCRC, Lubavitch of Indiana and the Hasten Hebrew Academy, where he had been vice-president and scholarship committee chairman for over 20 years.

He is also past president of Keren L'Israel Investment Club and a founder of the Indianapolis Yiddish Club. Mike has worn many different kippot over the years.

He has been a leather craftsman, printer, writer, editor, lecturer, teacher and volunteer. Until his retirement three years ago, Mike headed the Indiana-Illinois regional office of Israel


Bonds for 33 years. He joined Israel Bonds in order to "better serve and do something meaningful for our people." During his tenure, Mike's office has generated some \$100 million investment capital for Israel.

Mike is a recipient of numerous awards, including the Sagamore of the Wabash (Indiana's highest award, 1999); the Hasten Hebrew Academy's prestigious HAI-Life Award (1995); the Jewish Federation's Frank Newman award for outstanding professional (2003); and the State of Israel Guardian of Peace/Shomer Shalom award (1999).

The Blains are members of Congregation B'nai Torah and Beth-El Zedeck, the JCC, the Indiana Jewish Historical Society, Simon Wiesenthal Center, Yad Vashem, AIPAC, United States Holocaust Museum and other national organizations.



Students become Peer Trainers, learning how to work with their peers to distinguish between personal freedom and discriminatory behavior. Since 1991, more than 5,000 students have been trained as Peer

Trainers, influencing the lives of more than 60,000 students in the U.S. and abroad.

In May 2007, ADL's Midwest Investigative Researcher and the Midwest Area Counsel trained members of the FBI, the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of Indiana, the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, the Joint Terrorism Task Force, the Indiana State Police, and others. The training focused on domestic terrorism, extremist groups, extremist use of the Internet, hate crimes, and a discussion on state and federal hate crime laws. ADL continues to provide hate crimes response training to the cadet class of the Indiana State Police Academy.

Julian Center children's library opens

Children who call The Julian Center a temporary home can now find literary refuge at the new shelter library established by Jewish Women International (JWI) and the Verizon Foundation. The Verizon Foundation donated \$15,000 to fund JWI's children's library at The Julian Center, the newest of 32 libraries established in the nation, and the first in Indiana.

JWI's National Library Initiative is working to establish 100 children's libraries in domestic violence shelters across the United States. The Julian Center, which offers counseling, safe shelter and education for survivors of domestic violence and their families, has transformed an underutilized room into a library – complete with 250 new books, small and

large rocking chairs, bookcases, a study table and chairs, carpet and a computer desk, chair and printer.

"All too often, women and children fleeing from an abusive home aren't able to bring anything with them," said Ann DeLaney, executive director of The Julian Center. "A library for children can be of particular comfort, especially when children are forced to leave behind all that is familiar and comfortable, such as books and toys."

JWI's National Library Initiative began in 2003 as an effort to reach the youngest victims of domestic violence and help set them on a path to educational stability, emotional recovery and future success. Children fleeing abusive situations often suffer from emotional trauma and an interruption in their education, which can lead to school and then workforce struggles. The National Library Initiative seeks to break the cycle of violence by creating safe havens within shelters where children can study, read, do homework and form a healthy bond with their mothers.

"Our National Library Initiative would not be as successful without the tremendous support of organizations like Verizon, an organization equally committed to domestic violence awareness and prevention," said Lori Weinstein, executive director of JWI. "We are so fortunate to have found such a devoted community partner with whom to join forces and make our society a better place."

The Verizon Foundation and Verizon Wireless are recognized nationally for their support of domestic violence awareness and prevention initiatives along with literacy programs. Last year, the Verizon Foundation invested nationwide nearly \$5 million in community grants, technology solutions and volunteer hours.

Through its long-running HopeLine® phone recycling and reuse program that turns no-longer-used wireless phones

into support for survivors of domestic violence, Verizon Wireless last year awarded more than \$1.5 million in cash grants and 63 million minutes of service to help domestic violence organizations and their clients nationwide. In Indiana last year, the company donated nearly \$200,000 in cash grants, phones and airtimes to local domestic violence agencies and shelters.

"This new library demonstrates our ongoing commitment to make a difference in our community," said Michelle Gilbert, public relations manager, Indiana/Kentucky/Michigan Region, Verizon Wireless, who delivered an additional 625 children's books donated by Verizon Wireless employees in Indianapolis. "We hope this library at The Julian Center feeds the creativity of children in temporary refuge and strengthens their desire to learn."
