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Mickey's Corner Earns an Emmy!

The JCC's Live Talk Show Featuring Host Mickey Maurer

On Sept. 14, the JCC of Indianapolis proudly announced receipt of an Emmy Award for *Mickey's Corner* featuring host Mickey Maurer and guest Sylvia McNair. On Sat., Sept. 12, at the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences (NATAS) 40th annual awards, the JCC's live talk show was recognized for excellence with the highest award given in television. *Mickey's Corner* won in the Interview/ Discussion – Program/Series or Special category.

The Mickey's Corner episode with the famed soprano was taped live at the Arthur M. Glick JCC on Nov. 5, 2008. Michael Husain, founder of Good Vibes Media, produced the show in conjunction with JCC staff and WFYI productions. Clayton Taylor, WFYI's VP of production operations, said, "The evening had all the right

ingredients for a perfect show. Mickey, of course, is always a terrific interviewer, and Sylvia McNair's performances were magical."

For more than an hour, Mickey engaged Sylvia in a conversation about her spectacular career as an opera singer, violinist and cabaret singer, and her defiant struggle against an aggressive form of breast cancer. The at-times intensely personal conversation was punctuated by the singer's enthusiastic performances of folk music, opera and fiddling. With humor and grace, Sylvia captivated the entire audience of more than 200 people.



Major Gift Promotes Early Childhood Literacy in Indy

The Indianapolis-Marion County Public Library Foundation has announced a \$1 million gift from The Herbert Simon Family Foundation to expand the Library's "Ready to Read" early childhood literacy initiative.

"Ready to Read" prepares children under age five for a successful start in school through a series of specialized programs and services. Activities funded by this major gift will help preschoolers develop the basic skills for learning to read.

To enhance a key component of the initiative that focuses on community outreach, called "On the Road to Reading," the gift will allow the IM-CPL to quadruple the number of children in licensed, homebased daycare centers who receive book deliveries and listen to story time programs monthly. Nearly 2,600 children each year will be served in up to 260 home daycares. Home daycare providers themselves will learn how to more effectively engage young people in stories and use books to enhance children's early literacy skills.

The Library also will develop more programming for early learners and their caregivers within branch libraries, provide new child-friendly computers equipped with edu-

cational software throughout the library system, dedicate a new early learning website for children and caregivers, and increase staff training and program evaluation.

"We are grateful for The Herbert Simon Family Foundation's support," stated Library Foundation President Danny Dean. "A respected community leader, Mr. Simon is also an avid reader. We are honored he chose to share his enthusiasm for reading with the children of Indianapolis through a gift to the Library Foundation," he added.

Implementation of the newest early literacy efforts will begin in 2010, with installation of related technology continuing in 2011 and 2012.

Dr. Zornberg was born in London and grew up in Glasgow, Scotland, where her father was a rabbi and the head of the Rabbinical Court. She studied with him from childhood; he was her most important teacher of Torah. She holds a BA and PhD in English literature from Cambridge University. After teaching English literature at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, she turned to teaching Torah. For the past 25 years, she has taught Torah in Jerusalem at Matan, Pardes and the Jerusalem College for Adults. Dr. Zornberg also holds a Visiting Lectureship at the London School of Jewish Studies. She travels widely, lecturing in Jewish, academic and psychoanalytic settings. Zornberg is the author of several books.

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
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Holocaust curriculum featured at Indianapolis workshop

n Mon., Oct. 19, 2009, Deborah Batiste of the Anti-Defamation League will come to Indianapolis to present the ADL Curriculum Echoes and Reflections: A Multimedia Curriculum of the Holocaust. The workshop will begin at 5:30 p.m. in the Bureau of Jewish Education Domont Auditorium, 6711 Hoover Rd. This workshop is part of the BJE "We Must Bear Witness" series that trains educators in Holocaust education in order to comply with state mandates.

Whether teaching a full semester Holocaust studies course or including information about the Holocaust in a unit of study on World War II, Echoes and Reflections allows teachers to choose as little or as much material as they can cover in a specific time period and still cover the subject matter effectively. Developed primarily for use with high school students, the curriculum has also been adapted successfully to accommodate both younger and older students.

Ten (10) multipart lessons are provided with a companion DVD of over two-and-ahalf hours of visual history and testimony from survivors and other witnesses of the Holocaust. Each of the interdisciplinary lessons is supported with numerous primary source documents,

including poems, literature excerpts, maps, photographs, timelines, a glossary, and student handouts.

Echoes and Reflections is the result of an unprecedented partnership among three leaders in education: the Anti-Defamation League, the USC Shoah Foundation Institute for Visual History and Education, and Yad Vashem. This resource includes everything teachers need to teach the complex issues of the Holocaust and its lessons for to-

Founded in 1911, the Bureau of Jewish Education is the central agency for Jewish education in central Indiana, serving as a resource for community synagogues, day schools, agencies, and institutions involved in Jewish education. Each year, the BJE hosts workshops about Holocaust Education in the fall and spring. In addition to teacher training, the BJE also provides Holocaust Trunks and speakers to schools throughout the state and offers tours of the local Holocaust Memorial Garden. 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Shortz entertains at the JCC

In front of a standingroom-only crowd at the Arthur M. Glick JCC on the evening of Wed., Sept. 2, another edition of "Mickey's Corner" took place. The guest for this IU's individualized major episode of the Emmy-nominated local talk show was surely unique: the only man in America with a degree in enigmatology (the study of puzzles), Will Shortz.

NPR's Weekend Edition Sunday, crossword editor of The New York Times, former editor of Games magazine, and the Magazine in 1978, serving as founder and director of the American Crossword Puzzle Tournament, Shortz is a native Hoosier.

Mr. Shortz, introduced by Maurer as a "puzzle rock

star," was born in Crawfordsville, Ind., and obtained that rare diploma in enigmatology from Indiana University Bloomington in 1974.

He created his degree via program, after designing his own academic program. Following his earning a law degree from the University of Virginia though, Shortz bypassed the legal field, never The puzzle master for took the bar exam, and instead pursued a career in puzzles.

> Shortz began with Games editor for his final four years (1989-1993). Since 1993, he has been the crossword puzzle editor for The New York Times – the fourth in the paper's history. (Two of the

four have actually hailed from Indiana.)

ShortzMr. has also dabbled in writing. He's authored or edited more than 100 books and currently owns over 20,000 puzzle books and magazines dating back to 1545. The puzzle master claims his is the world's largest private collection on the sub-

In 1996, Shortz claimed fame with



zle, designed by acquaintance Jeremiah Farrell, with two correct solutions to the same set of clues: one saying that the "Lead story in tomorrow's newspaper" would be "BOB DOLE ELECTED," and the other correct solution saying "CLINTON ELECTED." He and Mickey Maurer completed the puzzle during the interview in front of an astounded audience. Dole and Clinton, along with many celebrities, are confessed "fans" of Shortz's puzzles.

Shortz has also been mentioned in the Simpsons TV show as well as the featured films Batman and Wordplay. He wrote riddles for The Riddler in the former movie, and the latter was a 2006 film billed as "A journey into the world of Will Shortz."

Shortz no longer considers crossword puzzles a "craze" as they were in the 1920s, but insists they're still immensely popular. The current craze is Sudoku, he admits, which though technically brought to the U.S. via the Japanese, was actually invented by an architect in Indianapolis.

Residing outside New York City in the small town of Pleasantville, NY, Shortz enjoys working from home, "making his own hours," and not having a commute.

He likes "bringing puzzle people together." While he's rather content and happy with his lot in life, Shortz's other passion is now table tennis. In fact, the interview with Maurer occurred during a "table tennis road trip" he and a friend were on through the Midwest. Shortz seeks to be the highest-rated player in the over-50 age group at some point. He's currently ranked in the top 20,000.

To those seeking advice on uncommon careers, Shortz succinctly noted that if you like something, "see if you can do it for a living" as that will "give you the most amount of pleasure." He added, "pick a career in which you don't mind the tedious." For others he mentioned that puzzles "pleasure the brain," and are good for health, often delaying the onset of Alzheimer's.

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


